Course Description

This course offers a survey of the history of Jewish magic, mysticism, and esoteric traditions from the Middle Ages through the sixteenth century. We will explore the concept of *sod* (mystery) and its historical developments, reading excerpts from foundational texts of Jewish esotericism, including *Sefer Yetzirah*, the *Bahir*, and the *Zohar*. We will also consider the domain of "practical Kabbalah"—the preparation and use of amulets and charms—as well as phenomena of demonic and angelic possession.

Learning Goals

The course is designed to familiarize students with the central concepts, key figures, and major currents in the history of Jewish mystical and esoteric traditions.

Course Requirements

This seminar emphasizes discussion and close textual analysis. All reading assignments listed under a given session should be completed by that date. The materials are often dense and require careful, repeated reading. You are expected to research any unfamiliar technical terms, names, or theological and theosophical ideas. **Please print and bring to class all readings marked as** *primary*.

To foster the kind of dynamic, engaged conversation this class is meant to encourage, you will be asked to put away laptops, phones, and other multi-use screens during our sessions. Fountain pens are not, strictly speaking, required—but they are highly recommended.

The final decision on any grade derives from my global assessment of your work and cannot be quantified exactly. Roughly speaking, however, the breakdown is as follows:

Participation: 40%

One 5-page paper, an analysis of a Kabbalistic source: 20%

One 10-page final paper: 40%
